WACO NATIVE RECEIVES A DOCTORATE DEGREE

On the surface, Jacqueline is a quiet wife, mom, and grandmother. What most people don't know is Jacqueline has quite the past. She was born Jacqueline Renee Shelton into a military family. Both of her parents, Reby Shelton (Johnson) of Pelham, TX and James Shelton from Connellsville, PA, were enlisted in the US Air Force. Jacqueline is the third of four children: James Jr. (deceased 2022), Reva, and Jan (deceased after birth). The military relocated the family to several destinations before returning to Waco, TX, in 1972.

Jacqueline attended Brook Avenue Elementary School, North Junior High School, and graduated from Waco High School in 1979. She attended one semester at McLennan Community College the summer after graduating but had already enlisted in the Air Force. In December of 1979, Jacqueline traveled to San Antonio, TX (Lackland Air

Force Base) to begin her military career. She planned to do one enlistment (four years) and come back to Waco. Jacqueline was trained as an Administrative Specialist which

meant she was a secretary whose duties included taking care of all members in her section, managing the daily activities of officers and the higher ranking enlisted.

Her duties included typing, personnel, finance, budgets, travel, and purchasing. Jacqueline was a one-person stop for up to 150 to 200 members at a time. At her last duty station, her duties remained the same and gained an additional duty of being a dorm mom to Air Force Cadets. Her military career took her to Michigan, Germany, South Dakota, England, back to San Antonio, and Alabama with small tours between the main assignments. She was honorably retired on April 1, 2000, after serving 20 years, four months and 18 days of active military service

Atlanta, GA was Jacqueline's next stop. She had no

RODNEY HOWELL, JR: THE BENEFITS OF MUSIC IN EDUCATION

Now that school is in session, music can be heard in the hallways and on the practice fields. But, how and why does music attract and motivate students? According to the opening lyrics of the song, "Sir Duke, by Stevie Wonder, "Music is a world within itself with a language we all understand."

Mr. Rodney Howell Jr.,

a dedicated music teach-

er with 6years of experience in Killeen Independent School District provided insight into the benefits of music. His musical roots run deep. Rodney has performed internationally and continues to perform. He has a genuine connection and love for music and its transformative effect. Rodney states, "What keeps me coming back to teach is in my class, students start with a blank slate. What they learn at this level is different from what they learned in elementary school. They don't know that they're going to love music, and that's very gratifying to watch. Generally, when students enter band, they have no idea what to expect. There's no auditioning, no pre-qualifications, I will teach them everything they need to know. That relieves pressure from the students.'

Two questions Mr. Howell answered were, what are the benefits of listening to music and what are the benefits of learning music. He explains, "Before children are born, they hear music. Some parents intro-

duce classical music. "Instrumentals help the brain dissect the differentiations of sound. Whereas, music with lyrics aid in the development of phonics and language. Both are equally important to cognitive development.

Music affects moods. students move throughout the building, I play music. They begin to move and get in the mood for the next class. As students transition, I may play blues or another genre to encourage them to analyze the beat. Some students will listen while they reflect or imagine. Even when the music is unfamiliar, students are analyzing the rhythm, instruments, beats, arrangements and patterns. The sound created by music is captivating and it develops musical acuity."

Learning music teaches a student how to commit and stick with something. Once an instrument is chosen, they have to commit. That's a good life

family in Georgia but felt Atlanta would be a great place to raise her three children. Besides, starting over in new places was nothing she hadn't done before. She found a job as an executive administrative assistant with IBM. The job helped fill a gap but was not satisfying. so she kept looking for other opportunities. The Coca-Cola Company was the perfect place, where she was hired as an administrative specialist and purchaser for the company headquarters. Laboratory was a position she was used to, and the pay was more than satisfying. The position was similar to her military duties. She was busy supporting two local and five global laboratories around the world, tracking several million-dollar annual budgets, creating purchase orders, paying bills, ordering and warehousing chemicals, meeting with vendors, working with executive local and global travel, and so much more. Jacqueline worked with scientists and chemists who looked like she and it was here that she became serious about a college degree. She was the only person in her department without a degree.

Throughout Jacqueline's military career, she took college courses but never obtained a degree. In 2004,

Jacqueline restarted her education at Shorter College which had campuses located all around Atlanta. The great thing about Shorter College is they offer night classes tailored towards working adults. At this time, Jacqueline was a single parent of three, was working on a career, and now. working on being a full-time student. In 2006, Jacqueline graduated from Shorter College with a bachelor's degree in business management. She went back to Shorter University (name change) and in 2011 and received her master's degree in organizational leadership with a 4.0 GPA. Now, she was equal to her peers at work.

She felt accomplished but not satisfied so she enrolled in an online doctorate program at Grand Canyon University in December 2012. This time she wanted to study religion. 



THIS NOVEMBER VOTE FOR ALBERT HUNTER TO SUPPORT PUBLIC SCHOOLS

If you care about public education in Texas, one of the most important races on the ballot this November will be the race for Texas House District 13. This district is made up of part of Eastern McLennan County - including East Waco, Bellmead, Mart and Hallsburg - as well as Bosque, Hill, Limestone, Freestone, and Falls counties.

If you live in District 13, you will get to choose between Democrat, Albert Hunter, and Republican, Angelia Orr, for your Representative to the Texas House.

Albert Hunter decided to run for the Texas House of Representatives because he believes in Public Schools. He became concerned that the incumbent, Angelia Orr, did not support public schools as well as she should have in the last legislative session, so he decided to run against her.

At issue is the question of school vouchers, also known as Education Savings Accounts (ESAs) or "Parent Choice." School vouchers are a way of using public school money to subsidize tuition to private schools. During the last session of the Texas Legislature, Governor Greg Abbott and a block of Republi-

can legislators tried to pass a bill that would have provided for vouchers of at least \$8,000 per student per year for parents to use for tuition to private schools.

Proponents of school vouchers say school vouchers give low-income families the "choice" to take advantage of private schools.

Opponents School Vouchers say that vouchers don't really end up helping low-income families much at all. The money being offered is not enough to cover private school tuition, much less other expenses like books, uniforms, food and transportation. That means the people who end up benefiting most from the vouchers are not lowincome people, but people who can already afford to have their kids in private school. In Indiana, for example, they have had a voucher program for several years. According to a study done in 2018, the average voucher student there is "a white, elementary-aged girl who lives in a metropolitan area and comes from a household of around 4.7 people making around \$100,000." (Journal of Policy Analysis and Management, Vol. 37, No. 4, 783–808,2018).

People in rural areas generally oppose school vouchers. The public schools in rural communities are often the centerpiece of community pride and one of the largest employers. These communities often do not even have a private school available. Vouchers do not help rural communities. People who live in these communities would rather see the money invested in the already underfunded public school system.

Governor Abbott's voucher plan failed to pass during the last legislative session, largely because representatives from rural communities voted against it. The Governor called four special sessions to try to pass the bill, but he could not get the bill through the Texas House of Representatives. Governor Abbott has already promised that he will push the voucher plan again in the 2025 Legislative beginning in January

Angelia Orr of Texas House District 13 voted against the voucher plan until the very last vote in the very last special session. Then she flipped. She voted for vouchers in that very last vote. She has since been endorsed by Governor Abbott and will almost certainly vote for vouchers in the next session if she is re-elected.

Albert Hunter is firmly opposed to school vouchers. A current school board member in Meridian and a former high school math teacher, Hunter believes the voucher program is a scam that will hurt public schools and especially rural schools. If elected, Hunter plans to vote against vouchers and instead to push for better funding for public schools, particularly in rural areas.

Albert Hunter was born in Meridian, Texas, and has lived there all his life. He graduated high school in Meridian and attended MCC, then graduated from Tarleton with a bachelor's degree mathematics and physical education, and a master's in education administration.

Hunter taught school in several districts including Cleburne High School, La Vega High School, Morgan High School and Clifton High School over the years before retiring in 2012. Since retiring, he has volunteered in various capacities and is involved in the

Heart of Texas Council of Governments Area Agency on Aging and the Friends of Meridian Lake State Park board. He also is on the Meridian ISD board.

Hunter says he always wanted to be a teacher, ' because I had wonderful teachers when I was growing up. They instilled a set of values into me that if they were there to help people, and educate people, and bring them along, then I felt compelled to do the same thing because education is very important. Back in those days, you know, they always said, 'Education is the way out.' So, if you are in an impoverished situation you need to become educated, so that you can learn ways to help improve yourself and those around you."

Even though Hunter is from Meridian, he has ties to East Waco. He had an aunt who lived on Faulkner Lane, and a brother who lived on Dallas Street, so he has been in and out of East Waco guite a bit.

"I am the baby of a family of five," Hunter says. "My grandfather was a sharecropper. He worked on a ranch farm outside of town there, raised five girls. One of them was my mother, and farming has always been a part of his life as well as his Christian beliefs. So, I was brought up in Christian beliefs in a rural community with a family that believed in helping each other out. So, we were often, you know, going different places, gathering things, taking them, sharing with people, whether they were family members or not. And so that's kind of how I was brought up, in a very caring environment.'

"I don't think the people in my district feel that their issues have a chance of being heard or addressed," Huner says. "I want to let them know that I feel like I can address those issues. I know how working together with good people around you can make things better. I want to let people know that their voice will not go unheard."

Education is Hunter's number one issue, if he is elected, but he is also concerned about mental health issues for young and old, and especially for veterans. He is very concerned about homelessness, especially among veterans. Water management is also a big issue as well as support for rural hospitals and medical clinics.





MY FAMILY HISTORY FROM 1755 TO 2024

In 1987, I was working for an oil and gas company named Cherokee Oil. President Reagan had decided to use Iraqi Oil instead of American Oil. Sadaam Hussan was his current golden boy of choice. Oklahoma had rescued other states in the past but nobody came to rescue us. Our boom went bust so Cherokee Oil became bankrupt. My new job became handing people a pink slip and a box. Then walking them out to their cars and motioning for the security guy to come and change the key codes on the door. Cherokee Oil was dying.

My grandmother was a very healthy woman but at 92 years old, became ill in the hospital. My mother and her siblings asked my first cousin and me to care for their mother. I turned in my resignation and told the company that I would rather care for a dying grandmother than for a dying company.

This was one of the best decisions that I made. My cousin took care of our grandmother

for 12 hours during the day and I cared for her 12 hours at night. We helped her live for 10 more years.

We would laugh about various things like her love for the most prettiest man God made - Billy D Williams and her disdain for the funniest looking man God made - Ayatollah Khomeini.

My grandmother would talk to me about her emancipated grandparents and her dad. Her mom gave birth to my great uncle but never regained her strength. Her mother passed away at just 26 years old. At 10 years old, my dear grandmother saw her beloved mother take her last breathe. This terrible memory never left my grandmother or her brother. My great uncle always felt guilty for his mom's death even though we tried to convince him otherwise.

The last weekend in August 2024, we had a much anticipated family reunion. This event brought back both fond and sad memories of our ancestors of old. Family stories were shared. Questions remain unanswered. New relatives from around the country were discovered. Relationships were rekindled.

Family historians learned from each other and attempted to weave our complicated histories into one cohesive family tree that started from 1755 to the present 2024. We now know the names of our ancestors and know more about their difficult journeys here in the United States of America. an instrument gives kids an opportunity to showcase another talent. Intelligence is on display in class, and the results of that level of success repeats itself.



IS ANGER GETTING YOU WHAT YOU WANT?

"Venting your anger does not work. Research shows that when people scream, swear, and throw things in a fury, they become more enraged. Once you come to understand you are driving your own anger with your thoughts, you can stop it." - Doris Wilde Helmering

FIVE WAYS TO HANDLE ANGER

- 1. Passive avoid problems, gives in; "I'm uncomfortable so I'll withdraw; I'll get out."
- 2. Aggressive attacks, demands; "I can take care of myself. I win, you lose. I'm
- 3. Passive-Aggressive indirect, sneaky, underhanded, sabotage; "I'll give in, but I'll get you.'
- 4. Assertive open, honest, mutual respect; "I have worth and value, you have worth and value.
- 5. Drop it recognizing personal limits and making healthy choices. "I choose to forgive.

CHOICES IN ANGER MANAGEMENT

1. Acknowledge the hurt. Own your own feelings hon-

2. Admit you are angry and take responsibility for your part by responding rather than reacting.

True Guilt - the fact I have wronged another for my own selfish gain

False Guilt - the feeling that I have not lived up to another's expectations

- 3. Recognize your natural angry style - Passive - Aggressive - Passive Aggressive
- 4. Identify the root cause. It is easier to be angry than to be hurt or fearful.
- 5. Realize that you have worth and value regardless of what others say or how they treat you.
- 6. Behavior is chosen and purposeful. Angry expressions are the results of choices. Develop a new purpose. Choose new behaviors.
- 7. Trying to figure out the past will only keep you stuck in the past. Take what you can use and leave the rest behind. Continually failing keeps one from facing the discomfort of really changing. Forgive the past and get on with your life. Don't hold grudges or complaints.
- 8. Use internal controls not external forces. "You made

me mad" is external and gives up your power. "I choose to not be offended" is internal and is empowering.

- 9. Know yourself and what ticks you off. Become aware of your angry triggers. Purposely give up control of others and learn to control yourself. "When your emotions become less mysterious and more familiar to you, they will stop controlling you." - Dr. Les Carter
- Keep your lifestyle consistent with your values. "Some of us create our own anger by making poisonous

choices." - Dr. Frank Minirth

- 11. Choose to release yourself for the things you said or did. For the things you did not say or do. For the things you could not possibly have said or done.
- 12. Choose to release the other person for his/her part. Forgive even if you are never asked to forgive. Forgive even when it seems unreasonable. To stop being angry does not wipe the offender's slate clean. "Forgiveness is a gift you give yourself." -- Dr. Robert Schuller
- 13. Learn to express thoughts without attacking. Avoid power struggles.
- 14. Learn to be assertive. Ask for your needs to be met. Tell, don't assume. Be specific and to the point. It still counts

even if you must spell it out! **WAYS TO COOL DOWN**

- 1. Change your stance. Sit down, lower voice, breath deep, recite mantra or count to ten.
- 2. Keep an angry calendar. Mark an x on your calendar every time you become angry.
- 3. Recognize your hot buttons. Keep a record of your anger and learn to defuse.
- 4. Avoid name calling. It is hard to feel concern or empathy for someone you profane.
- 5. Deal with the real issue. Evaluate what is really bothering you.

UNITY, JUSTICE AND THE BAHÁ'Í FAITH

The Founder of the Bahá'í Faith, Bahá'u'lláh, identified the single most important human need in all of his books and writings: Unity. He said to all humanity: "Ye are all the leaves of one tree and the drops of one ocean."

This core Bahá'í teaching takes a step beyond the Golden Rule. That law, found in all the major religions, teaches us to treat others as we would want to be treated ourselves. But the primary principles of our Faith call us to a higher understanding – that we are all part of one unified reality, like the individual cells in all living things. When we harm others, we harm ourselves.

Bahá'u'lláh compared the human race to the human body. Afflicting one part of the body can threaten the entire organism. This awareness links unity and peace with justice. In the words of Baha'u'llah: "The light of men is Justice. Quench it not with the contrary winds of oppression and tyranny. The purpose of justice is to establish unity among men."

Bahá'u'lláh extended and expanded the Golden Rule, asking us all to focus on mer-

cy towards others, writing: "O son of man! If thine eyes be turned towards mercy, forsake the things that profit thee and cleave unto that which will profit mankind. And if thine eyes be turned towards justice, choose thou for thy neighbor that which thou choosest for thyself."

Bahá'u'lláh's teachings charge Bahá'ís everywhere to work for justice and what it must accomplish – removing the barriers of oppression, tyranny, hatred, and boundaries, bringing us together as one world and one people.

In his great work "Epistle to the Son of the Wolf," Bahá'u'lláhwrote, "The essence of all that We have revealed for thee is Justice, for man to free himself from idle fancy and imitation, to discern with the eye of oneness His glorious handiwork and look into all things with a searching eve."

Bahá'u'lláh also wrote, "Justice hath a mighty force at its command. It is none other than reward and punishment for the deeds of men. By the power of this force, order is established throughout the world, causing the wicked to restrain their natures for fear of punishment."

This glorious ideal invokes the vision of the poets and the great prophets throughout time. For Bahá'ís, this is not just some pipe dream – we see it as a reality that we can accomplish, as the inevitable outcome of the centuries of progressive religious revelation given to humanity by God.

initiatives are essential steps we must take.






