"He is absolutely legit!" said Rev. George Johnson, a former Waco pastor and one of Iglehart's spiritual mentors. "I've known him since he was a kid. He is not only absolutely determined to serve God, but he has had a transformation, a 360-degree turn-around."

Cedric Iglehart was raised as a Christian by Christian parents, Raydell and Doris Iglehart, but when he became an adult, he strayed away from their teachings. His decisions set him up for self-destruction. He was arrested several times in his 20's for drug posses-

sion and DWI's. "But through it all, God showed me His favor. I was never convicted of a felony, although I probably should have been," Iglehart confessed.

Iglehart admits going through life with no real understanding of who he was. "I eventually found myself in a situation where my self-loathing and immaturity finally did lead to a felony conviction in 2014." He was sentenced to eight years in TDCJ. By then,

Created in 1938 at Harvard University, the Nieman Foundation aims to promote and elevate the standards of journalism. Each year promising journalists from across the world come to Harvard and devote a year of study to the field of journalism. The result of their work is published in the "Nieman Report." In one of the reports, a reporter for The Courier-Journal in Louisville, Kentucky, Larry Muhammad, writes, "Once considered an outdated protest medium, the black press today is appreciated as crucial to ethnic progress." According to the report, the African American Press is



IGLEHART RALLIES TO RENOVATE WACO'S ALPHA THEATRE

Dr. Patricia Ann Iglehart, the

founder of Just as I am Ministries, a 401C non-profit, has a vision to renovate the Historic Alpha Theatre at 221 Clif-

ton Street in Waco. Though she was in a serious car accident this year, nothing has distracted her from her vision. She walked out of the hospital, according to Baylor, Scott, & White with three broken ribs based on X-rays; however, she has never experienced any pain in her ribs. She was back on track with her mis-

The Alpha Theatre was donated to Just As I Am Ministries, Inc. by the family of the late Charles Iglehart.

The State of Texas Historic Commission has approved the Alpha Theatre as the recipient of a Recorded Historical Marker. This designation recognizes the historical role of three Black visionary WWII Veterans, Heyward Weaver, Jr., Edward Bonner, Jr., and George Pryor.

They obtained financing for the movie theater in the Black East Waco Community through the Federal Reconstruction Finance Corporation, a Depression-Area Financial agency, that made loans to small businesses.

They commissioned two Black brothers in their community, Clarence Iglehart, Sr., and his brother, Henry Dirk Iglehart, who owned the East Waco Fish Market on Clifton Street. The Alpha Theatre was a hit in the Black community and drew the attention of the publishers of JET Magazine. For more information, see Terri Jo Ryan's article in the Waco Tribune-Herald's June 18, 2011 issue and J.B. Smith's article in the February 1, 2015 issue of the Waco Tribune-Tribune ("Resurrecting the Alpha Theatre").

Alpha Theatre area was once known as Six Shooter Junction during the cattle rustling days of the old west. The theatre is conveniently locat-



Reading builds character in children, future adults, developing empathy toward other people, and allowing them to imagine or relate to what others experience.



RUTH'S RECORD

"As a young woman with modest means and few prospects. Ruth Middleton transformed her life by moving north. Taking a leap into the unknown as a Black woman in the 1910s required tremendous courage. Ruth was still a teenager at the time, living in Columbus, South Carolina, and laboring as a domestic. She may have already met her future fiancé, Arthur Middleton, a South Carolinian from Camden and a tiremaker by trade. And she would have known from what she heard and saw, and perhaps from incidents in her own life, that the South was still a dangerous place for African Americans at the start of the new century. The first generations to be born to freedom found few opportunities beyond the agricultural work their forebears had done, risked indebtedness in the share cropping system, and faced public humiliation as well as unpredictable violence in everyday life. Perhaps Ruth and Arthur evaluated their situation and determined that only dramatic change would better it. For they, like so many other African Americans fed up with the dusty prejudice of the South, packed their retinue of things and traveled northward seeking safety and opportunity." (25-26).

SEARCHING FOR ROSE

"The lack of information about Ruth Middleton's ancestor Rose is enough to stop the heart. But as difficult as it will be for us to identify Rose with the use of historical records, images, maps, the Internet, and freedom of movement at our disposal, it would have been exponentially harder for Rose and Ashley to reunite once they had been split apart by sale. Yet throughout the course of their separate lives, mother and daughter did not forsake each other. Nor did their descendent Ruth consign a vanished ancestor to ano-

nymity. Rose vowed to always love Ashley and pressed that promise into the sack. Ashley passed that promise down, along with the object and the story of its origins. Ruth reinforced their bond by stitching their story onto the bag. Despite the external devaluation of their family ties, evidence by forced sale and absence in the formal written record, these women valued one another as kin and understood

the transcendent worth of lineage."

"To bear proper witness to this testimony, to glean what this family's take can yield, and to count their story in the annals of history that would tend to exclude it, we will follow Ruth's lead. Just as Ruth's chronicle on the sack emphasizes individual women, a single event, and the material Rose packed, we will endeavor to augment their details of Rose's record, to confirm her account of southern transgressions, and to write her foremothers' history. (57-58).).

ROSES INVENTORY

"We have in Ashley's sack a nearly unparalleled opportunity for insights into the lives of enslaved women. In the bag Rose packed and the description Ruth appended, we see an index of treasures. I contrast to the blatant devaluation of enslaved people as people evident in slave owners' property lists, the slave woman's inventory, a countercompilation, points us to the deep worth of Black female human-

ity as well as the role of things in defending enslaved people's dignity as humans and as women." (127)

This complete and thorough examination of the life of Rose and her story—as well as those of her descendants—shows African American women with determination to escape slavery and re-stablish their humanity as human beings as well as their dignity. All that She Carried by Tiya Miles is an incredibly, powerful story of The Journey of Ashley's Sack, A Black Family Keepsake.

THE "WEIGHT-GAIN LACK OF ENERGY" STRUGGLE

As a health coach, I'm excited to offer a Health Q&A column for the readers of the Anchor News.

QUESTION: Hi Jerry, I've been struggling with weight gain and lack of energy that has gotten progressively worse every year. I gained a little weight with my first child 7 years ago but it really got worse after my second child 5 years ago. I'm turning 40 this year and everyone tells me it's just part of getting old. I feel like I'm physically missing something but don't know where to start. Can you help me figure out what to do? Thanks, Cori.

ANSWER: Hi Cori. You are thinking correctly that this isn't just part of getting old. No one should settle for weight gain or having a lack of energy just because you are getting older. While age can be a factor, it's not usually the main cause of health changes. More than likely, this stems from the combination of life changes that happen when going through pregnancy and having young children.

First, pregnancy can disrupt the bacterial balance in the gut. This is important not just be-

cause the gut plays a major role in our immune system but it also produces neurotransmitters that direct the function of both the brain and thyroid. Inefficient brain and thyroid function is likely the culprit of how you are feeling today. I'm not saying that your brain isn't working, it's just not working as well as it could.

With pregnancy and early childhood comes two other factors that disrupt the body's efficiency: food cravings and sleep deprivation. Most women have food cravings during pregnancy and most of the

time those cravings are not for healthy foods. Unhealthy foods will obviously be a cause of weight gain but what you don't see happening in physical appearance could be a bigger consequence. Unhealthy foods typically have toxins and chemicals that disrupt proper cell function leading to an array of mental, emotional, and physical issues.

As the parent of two children close in age, I know the lack of sleep issue well. Sleep is the time where our bodies recover and repair. When there is a lack of sleep, that recovery time gets cut short which leads to fatigue and energy loss.

With all of that explained, you need to see what fits for where you are. If your nutrition is off, make the necessary changes in your meals. If you need more sleep, plan your day around it. You may also find it helpful to get a blood test done to check on your vitamin, mineral, and hormone levels to verify everything is balanced properly.

While you can't change how you got to where you are today, what you do today will change where you are tomorrow.

And the LORD answered, 'It is because of Saul and his bloodthirsty house, because he killed the Gibeonites.' So, the king called the Gibeonites and spoke to them. Now the Gibeonites were not of the children of Israel, but of the remnant of the Amorites; the children of Israel had sworn protection to them, but Saul had sought to kill them in his zeal for the children of Israel and Judah.

"Therefore, David said to the Gibeonites, 'What shall I do for you? And with what shall I make atonement that you may bless the inheritance of the LORD?'

"And the Gibeonites said to him, 'We will have no silver or gold from Saul or from his house, nor shall you kill any man in Israel for us.

"So, he said, 'Whatever you say, I will do for you.'

"Then they answered the king, 'As for the man who consumed us and plotted against us, that we should be destroyed from remaining in any of the territories of Israel, let seven of his descendants be delivered to us, and we will hang them before the LORD in Gibeah of Saul, whom the LORD chose.

"And the King said, 'I will give them.'

"But king spared Mephiboseth the son of Jonathan, the son of Saul, because of the LORD'S oath that was between them, between David and Jonathan the son of Saul. So the king took Armoni and Mephihosheth, the two sons of Rizpah the daughter of Aiah, whom she bore to Saul, and the five sons of Michai the daughter of Saul, whom she brought up for Adriel the son of Barzillai the Meholathite; and he delivered them into the hands of the Gibeonites, and they hanged them on the hill before the

LORD. So they fell, all seven together and were put to death in the days of harvest, in the first days in the beginning of barley harvest.

Now Rizpah the daughter of Aiah took sackcloth and spread it for herself on the rock, from the beginning of harvest until the late rains poured on them from heaven. And she did not allow the birds of the air to rest on them by day nor the beasts of the field by night.

"And David was told what Rizpah the daughter of Aiah, the concubine of Saul, had done. Then David went and took the bones of Saul, and

the bones of Jonathan his son. from the men of Jabesh Gilead who had stolen them from the street of Beth Shan where the Philistines had hung them up, after the Philistines had struck down Saul in Gilboa. So he brought up the bones of Saul and the bones of Jonathan his son from there; and they gathered the bones of those who had been hanged. They buried the bones of Saul and Jonathan his son in the country of Benjamin in Zelah, in the tomb of Kish his father. So they performed all that the king commanded. And after that God heeded the prayer for the land." 2 Samuel 21:1-14



CONFLICTING EMOTIONS

The need for life to matter is critical and not to be denied. Each person is wonderful, special, and important. One life is worth no more or no less than another. Yet, it seems two problems yet remain:

1) Thinking you are somebody.

2) Thinking you are nobody. People often say. "I can't help how I feel." In some respects, there may be an element of truth there. It is true that we cannot control how another interacts with us, but we do have a lot of control over how we respond to them or to others.

My mother's sister, my Aunt Ruth, enjoyed sitting safely on the screened-in back porch and watching the storm. Through her calmness, storms were to be respected, but not feared. Take appropriate actions for safety, or for sanity, or for composure.

As our thoughts place blame, we become vulner-

able to emotional reactions. Without trained, deliberate thinking, we easily become angry, resentful, and self-righteous. Trying to suppress our uncomfortable feelings, we dredge up toxic thoughts.

The more disempowered one is, the more violent one becomes.

By observing our thoughts and emotions, we can witness how they build on each other through our attachment to inner misconceptions. As a baby step to nonattachment, witness your thoughts before responding. Breath work helps tremendously.

As you become calm internally, feelings will settle of their own accord. If we are



he had lost everything -- his job, wife, kids, self-respect, and "even my will to live," he added.

"I remember waking up in a detox cell two days after my arrest and purposed it within myself to just lay down on that dirty concrete floor and die." But as God would have it, Iglehart would turn to Him. "It was shortly after I made the decision to die that I noticed the single 60-watt light bulb in my cell getting brighter, and brighter. The light became so bright that it hurt my eyes to look at it. With my eyes tightly closed and my body in the fetal position, I heard a voice in my head. This voice was dripping with clarity, authority, and love.

"You think you're hopeless. You think you're worthless. I can use you if you let me. Are you ready now?"

"I immediately knew it was the Lord. 'If you want this life, you can have it."'

Iglehart described feeling waves of energy pouring over his body, like water from a hose. He realized he was crying, and each tear was cleansing him, finally bringing him to the point of surrender. "God took advantage of the opportunity to come in and save me from myself." he said.

Iglehart spent nearly seven

years in prison, but God kept showing him that he could rely on Him to meet all of his needs. He focused on God's purpose for his life and on his spiritual gifts, one of which is teaching the Word. "My prison experience," explained Iglehart, "was more like going to a Seminary School," and Johnson Jr., agreed, saying Iglehart's mindset is different. "He is not the Cedric we knew years ago."

While in prison, Iglehart constantly heard of violent outbreaks in whatever facility he was in, but he never was never present to witness them. "God never let any of that come my way."

Iglehart says while serving his time, God dictated to him a 72-page manuscript." It was the start of his debut book, Real Life: How to Develop an Intimate Relationship with God, which was published in 2021. He is also the president of Real Talk Global Ministries, a teaching ministry all about showing people how to apply God's word to their life. The ministry consists also of a YouTube channel and a podcast, and Iglehart ministers through church appearances and social media.
