# DAD AND SON: BOTH PASTORS, BOTH DOCTORS, BOTH EXTREMELY INSPIRATIONAL

## -DR. JIMMY D. HUNTER-

Dr. Jimmy D. Hunter was born the eldest of five to the Late Jimmie D. Hunter, and the Late Georgia Mae Johnson-Hunter. He attended the Austin Public Schools graduating from the (Original) L. C. Anderson High School. He attended Huston-Tillotson College (now University) in Austin graduating with a Major in Vocal Music Performance and All-Level Music Education. He did further study at St. Edward's University in Austin in music and theater. He was Director of Music for 17 vears at Mount Zion Missionary Baptist Church in Austin. He served in numerous venues as Musical Director for local and state conventions and congresses.

Dr. Hunter was called into the preaching ministry in April 1986. Realizing a call to preach is also a call to preparation he entered formal seminary study at the Austin Presbyterian Seminary, August 1987. In August 1988, he transferred to the Samuel De-Witt Proctor School of Theology at Virginia Union University, Richmond, Virginia. He was conferred the Master of Divinity degree in May 1990. Returning to Virginia Union September 1995 he was conferred the Doctor of Ministry degree in May 1998.

After returning to Austin following the first seminary degree, he served on the Music Faculty at Huston-Tillotson University as Concert Choir Director and Instructor of Beginning Applied Voice and Piano August 1990 through December 1991. In November 1991 he was called as pastor of the Historic New Hope Missionary Baptist Church, Port Arthur, TX. The church grew spiritually, numerically and financially during his tenure. He was called and currently serves as pastor of Toliver Chapel Missionary Baptist Church since June 2001. The church continues to grow spiritually, numerically, and financially; and numerous ministries have been implemented under his leadership to enhance both church and

community. In 2009 he led the church into a \$700,00 total interior renovation and burned the note August 2016.

He has served in numerous capacities: Former Moderator of the Union Baptist District Association, leading them into the building of a new worship \$900,00 facility moving in debt free; Chaplain for a Day for the Texas Senate and House of Representatives;

Music Director for the Inaugural Prayer Service for the Late Ann Richards, Governor of Texas; Honor's Day Speaker for Huston-Tillotson University celebrating the merger of Samuel Huston college and Tillotson College, May 2003; Charter Day Speaker celebrating the designation of Huston-Tillotson University being named an All-Steinway Campus, October 2017; Chair of the Faith-Based Committee for the U.S. Census; Co-Chair for the Faith-Based Committee for the Educational Summit for the City of Waco and the Waco Independent School District; Five-Year tenure on the Waco Regional Airport Advisory Board; Three-Year tenure as a member of the Board of Advocates for the School of Social Work, Baylor University; and a Brother of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. He completed a three year tenure as a member of the Board of Trustees of Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, Texas, and visionary for Waco's Covid-19 "Souls

for Shots Campaign", Co-Music Director for the Baylor University McLane Stadium Palm Sunday Observance, duo-director of 450 voices in the 900 voice multi-ethnic choir, and a former member of the Advisory Board of Prosper Waco. His most recent accomplishment is completing the intensive study and receiving his licensure with the International Fellowship of Chaplains.

He published in Oxford Sermons in 2007 following an intensive study at Oxford University, Oxford, England, and has received a number of awards from a vast array of religious and social groups far too many to name.

He has been married to Pamelia Hytche-Hunter for the past 40 years, and they are the proud parents of two: J'Naudia Hunter-Phillips and Jamison Douglas Hytche Hunter, D.Min. His pride and joy are their four grandchildren: Kaitlyn Hunter Phillips, Jamie DeAnn, Janae DiAnn, and Jamison Douglas Hytche Hunter, II.

# -DR. JAMISON HUNTER-

Born in Austin, Texas, and raised in Port Arthur, Texas, Dr. Jamison Douglas Hytche Hunter brings both education and experience to his ministry and preaching assignment. Since he was a teenager, he has championed the gospel message with great joy and passion and distinguished himself as one who is truly committed to the rigors of continuing education and academic excellence.

Dr. Hunter studied at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore, Princess Anne, MD, to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree, a Master of Divinity from Howard University School of Divinity, Washington, DC, and completed a Doctorate of Ministry from United Theological Seminary, Dayton, OH.

Dr. Hunter is a 2013 inductee of the distinguished Martin Luther King Jr. Board of Preachers of Morehouse College. Dr. Hunter is the author of "Beyond the Walls: Transforming Worshippers to Witnesses." He served

as the youngest doctoral mentor to the Gardner C. Taylor Scholars from January 2013 to August 2019—a confab of doctoral candidates whose focus centered on prophetic leadership, social justice, and political action. With a love for academia, Dr. Hunter currently co-leads another cohort of doctoral students who focus on Preaching and Leadership for Small to Mid-Size Congregations.

With an overwhelming call to serve and lead, Dr. Hunter began his pastoral ministry at the Macedonia Missionary Baptist Church in Dayton, Ohio, as their 6th Pastor in November 2009. Under the power of God, He was used to effect fresh energy, trailblazing initiatives, ministry implementations, and notable growth in this traditional church context. Dr. Hunter's leadership led the church in an internal campaign to liquidate the \$600,000 balance owed on the multi-purpose facility. Most notably, a 2.2-million-dollar project

was completed for a newly constructed worship and youth center and total renovation of the original sanctuary into administrative offices, all for the glory of God. Doctor Hunter served Macedonia Missionary Baptist Church until his resignation in 2020.

In July 2020, Dr. Hunter was called to be the 8th Pastor of the Mount Jezreel Baptist Church of Silver Spring, Maryland. Amidst

the COVID pandemic, Pastor Hunter faced the major undertaking of redesigning the pulpit and sanctuary, which included adding a baptismal pool, cameras, lighting, media equipment, and upgraded sound system to transform the worship experience to best accommodate and connect in-person participants with virtual viewership. Pastor Hunter has taken Mount Jezreel into the world of technology and streaming by implementing various media platforms to share the Word of God. Under the dynamic leadership of Pastor Hunter, Mount Jezreel is experiencing disciple growth. In response to the growing needs of the membership, the Divorce Care and Rachel's Circle (ministers to women experiencing the loss of children) Ministries were formed. Pastor Hunter's love for the youth has evolved into what is now the E3 Ministry-his vision is to create a safe place where the youth can equip, educate, and empower

themselves to be dynamic disciples and leaders of tomorrow.

He is a life member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated, a financial and active member of Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity (The Boulé), and a silver member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). In August 2023, Dr. Hunter was appointed as the Seminary Dean of Maple Springs Baptist Bible College and Seminary in Capitol Heights, MD.

Having been nurtured in a distinguished tradition of Christian servant leaders, Dr. Hunter's father (Dr. Jimmy D. Hunter) serves as pastor of the Toliver Chapel Baptist Church in Waco, Texas. His maternal grandfather (the late Dr. William P. Hytche) served with the distinction (28 years) as President of the University of Maryland Eastern Shore. Family is very important to Dr. Hunter. He is married to Dr. Patrice Hunter, and they have three loving children.



It was pitch-black dark outside, as I had no time to flip on the outside lights. I just needed to get out. Once inside my car, I let out a sigh, unaware that I had been holding my breath. Quickly locking the car doors, I knew I was on my way. The car was run down and bent up, but it was my path to freedom tonight and my only means of transportation. I'll never forget it. It was a gray and black Toyota, well....a fading gray and a fading black, a hatchback, about 8 years old at the time, and a stick. Ha! A stick. That could be a holdup since I was still in the learning stage, but I could handle it. I tried to crank the old trap, but it just clicked. I tried again, combining my efforts with a plea. "Please God, I need my car!" Just as the motor turned over, I heard that dreadful sound, a swatch-type sound, like an old screen door dragging. My God! He knew I was going to try to get away. He

knew, so he had unlocked the hatch back, ahead of time! He was in the back so fast; all I could do was bite my lip and jerk forward. "Stop the car, Lynn, and give me the money!" he yelled, as he swiftly crawled into the back seat. He lurched through the bucket seats so fast that my head literally seemed to spin, like the girl in the Exorcist. Grabbing the steering wheel, he yelled again, "Gimme the money, Lynn!" The Exorcist...I was sure that his voice changed. But tonight...no, not tonight. I kept driving, the car swerving across into the other the lane and back again as he, too, gripped the wheel. You name it; I just about dealt with it. Many times over the years, I walked into my house to find that every piece of furniture and every appliance was gonesold in exchange for drugs. I remember waking up one Christmas Day to find that

my babies' gifts were gone, sold for drugs. Once, I frantically searched the streets of Tampa because my husband put our 6-year-old out of the car since it was "too dangerous to take him to the crack house," he said. This was before the days of cell phones. I don't even remember how I found my baby boy. I could go on and on, but the only thing that matters is that one day, I accepted the truth that I had to forgive if I expected to move on with my life. I have since come to grips with the truth, that my now ex-husband was a good person, who loved people. When he was straight, he would give away his last. When he was not, he would take another person's last. I literally saw him take his shirt off and give it away. Once he pulled off his watch and gave it away, and then took my watch and gave it away, too. He had a heart of gold, but in addiction, he was the devil. Still, I had to find a way to forgive. 

## **HOW TO AVOID SCAMS & SCHEMES**

Senior Citizens are the prime targets for scams and schemes. I just saw a YouTube video where an older black lady was nearly scammed out of her home by a person who said she was chosen to get remodeling assistance. She contacted Legal Aid and was able to thwart the scamming company before her home was stolen. There are many ways that senior citizens are scammed. We will review some of these scams and schemes in this issue and will review the rest next issue.

- 1. Phishing scams involve fake email or text messages that appear to be from reputable sources, such as banks, online retailers, or government agencies. These messages often contain links that direct you to fake websites designed to steal your personal information.
- a. Verify the Sender: Check the sender's email address for inconsistencies or suspicious domains.
- b. Don't Click Links: Do not click on links or download attachments from unknown or untrusted sources.
- c. Use Security Software: Install and update antivirus and anti-phishing software on your devices.
- d. Contact the Institution Directly:If you receive a suspicious email, contact the institution directly using a verified phone number or website.
  - 2. Phone Scams

Phone scams involve fraudulent calls from individuals claiming to be representatives of legitimate organizations, such as the IRS, tech support, or a charitable organization. They often pressure victims to provide personal information, make immediate payments, or buy gift cards.

- a. Hang Up: If you receive a suspicious call, hang up immediately. Do not talk with the caller.
- b. Do Not Share Personal Information: Never share personal information, such as Social Security numbers or bank details, over the phone unless you are certain of the caller's identity.
- c. Verify the Caller: If the call seems legitimate, verify it by contacting the organization directly using a trusted phone number.

d. Register with the Do Not Call List:\*\* Add your number to the National Do Not Call Registry to reduce unwanted calls.

3. Online Shopping Scams

Online shopping scams occur on fraudulent websites or through fake ads on legitimate sites. Scammers create counterfeit websites that look like real online stores, offering products at prices too good to be true. Once payment is made, the product is never delivered, or a substandard item is sent.

- a. Research the Website: Before making a purchase, research the website for reviews and ratings. Look for contact information and verify its legitimacy.
- b. Use Secure Payment Methods: Pay with credit cards or secure payment services like PayPal, which offer protection against fraud.
- c. Look for HTTPS: Ensure the website uses HTTPS (secure) rather than HTTP (unsecure) in the URL
- d. Be Wary of Too-Good-to-Be-True Deals: If an offer seems too good to be true, it likely is. Proceed with caution.





## PROTECTING SENIORS ONLINE FROM SCAMS, HACKS AND TAX FRAUD

(NewsUSA) - The vast majority of seniors today are using the Internet at least once a week to check email, pay bills online and keep in touch via social media. But all that time online puts them at risk for scams and hacks, such as tax fraud. In fact, a new survey by Home Instead, Inc., franchisor of the Home Instead Senior Care network, found that 67 percent of surveyed older adults have been the victim of an online scam or hack.

Encouraging seniors to practice cyber security can go a long way toward protecting their identity and sensitive financial information. Home Instead collaborated with the National Cyber Security Alliance to create Protect Seniors Online, available at www. ProtectSeniorsOnline.com, a free resource that educates older adults about cybersecurity. Here, seniors can test their cyber security skills with the "Can You Spot an Online Scam?" quiz.

themselves online: tect \*Password protect and secure devices, accounts. Lock all devices (including computers, tablets and smartphones) with secure passwords in case devices are lost or stolen. \*Think before clicking. When faced with an urgent request -- like emails asking for money -- think before clicking or get a second opinion. Clicking on links is

than half (51 percent) of seniors surveyed by Home Instead use social media to stay connected. Use care when sharing personal information, adjust privacy settings to limit who can see your information, and turn off location sharing.

- · Use security software. Install anti-virus and anti-spyware software and program it to run regularly. And be wary of pop-up ads or emails, many of which contain malware that can infect comput-
- · Log out. Log out of apps and websites when you are finished. Leaving apps and websites open on computer screens could make you vulnerable to security and priva-
- Recommend support. Older adults who live alone may need help from a trusted source -- such as a family member, tech-savvy friend or professional caregiver --to serve as a second set of eyes.







Prejudice, self-superiority and paternalism are contrary to our oneness. Only by developing a deep-seated, communal understanding of the oneness of humanity can we

hope to remedy the vast problems of a deeply troubled world.

Ultimately, Bahá'ís believe, the world will transcend the boundaries between nations, races and ethnicities. Distinctions and barriers between people will fall. The old global divisions — East and West, North and South, industrialized and developing countries — will disappear.

Humankind — having passed through its infancy and tumultuous puberty — will at last reach a stage of maturity, the adulthood of our species, in which we will achieve a new consciousness of the oneness of humanity. Today, the Bahá'í writings proclaim that the time has come for all of us to embrace our commonality, to encourage the recognition of our unity and to make a commitment to act with love and kindness toward the entire human family.

Once saved, always saved, by some is referred to as the eternal security of the believer. Some refer to the expression as the new birth or being born again. You will find the perfect explanation in the book of John, Chapter 3, Verses 1 through 31. You'll find a clearer explanation in Part 2 of this series.

Part 5 of this series ended with Revelation 3:3-5, indicating that God does blot names out of the Book of Life. I'm sure that you'll agree that there's no way that a name can be blotted out if it were never recorded. We must stop going by what we've heard only, but by what we've read

with our own eyes.

The following Scriptural passage gives us several examples about what happened concerning the children of Israel as God were delivering them out of the bondage of slavery from Egypt. All of them experienced the same thing, but all didn't handle it the same way. I don't believe that God will allow one person to die at the age of accountability without knowing that He exists. Since FREE Bible Apps are available in many different versions and languages, we will have no excuse when we stand before the Righteous Judge if we hadn't accepted Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord.

"Moreover, brethren, I do not want you to be unaware that all our fathers were under the cloud, all passed through the sea, all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea, all ate the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank

of that spiritual Rock that followed them, and that Rock was Christ. But with most of them God was not well pleased, for their bodies were scattered in the wilderness.

"Now, these things became our examples, to the intent that we should not lust after evil things as they also lusted. An do not become idolaters as were some of them. As it is written, 'The people sat down to eat and drink, and rose up to play.' Nor let us commit sexual immorality, as some of them did, and in one day twenty-three thousand fell, nor let us tempt Christ, as some of them also tempted, and were destroyed by serpents; nor complain, as some of them also complained, and were destroyed by the destroyer.

Now all these things happened to them as examples, and they were written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the ages have come.

"Therefore let him who thinks he stands take heed lest he fall. 



 which is embraced or disputed by what we are thinking






